

Dear Friends,

Thank you for your prayers and interest in what I am doing. Tuesday we left Machakos and drove back to Nairobi arriving shortly before lunch. I was given a room for 2 days at the AIM guest house called Mayfield. It is a very busy place with people coming and going all the time. Those from our ABO that are stationed in other countries left Wednesday and Thursday. I started my official Swahili lessons Wednesday. Thursday, I also moved out of the guest house to the employee housing behind the guest house. Below is a picture of my room where I will be spending the next month or so.



I will continue to work on Swahili and work with the Kenyan staff for the next month as well. In the afternoons, I have been learning my way around Nairobi.

Yesterday, Friday, has been the busiest day yet. I had language at 8:00am, at 9:30 we (the Mundy family and I) went to the hangar at Wilson for chapel and to meet most of the people we will be working with. We got a tour and met a bunch of the AIM administration people who have their offices in the hangar building. We stayed there for lunch since they were having a hamburger party. In the afternoon, we continued our tour of Nairobi by checking out Kibera, the largest slum in Kenya. It is estimated that over 1 million people live there. When we finished that, I came back to my new place and decided to do laundry since I have done it in a couple weeks. So for the next hour or so I washed my stuff **by hand** (yes they have machines but I am not allowed to use them as part of my experience.) I then took a quick shower and was picked up by a missionary colleague for supper.

Today, Saturday, is more free. I went shopping this morning and bought a headset to use with my computer to talk on the Internet. If you would like to talk to me I use Google talk (which is a free IM and voice program from Google). This afternoon I will be going out with the Mundy family (pilot mechanic family in my orientation) again for our last official orientation trip around Nairobi.

I also have added some more pictures to my website. Most of the pictures were taking by others in my orientation and wanted to add them to give a little broader prospective. Enjoy
